

## The Council on Podiatric Medical Education's Commitment Statement on Countering the U.S. Opioid Epidemic

The Council on Podiatric Medical Education (#PME) sees as the responsibility of the colleges of podiatric medicine in the United States a duty to address the need for a national response to counter the opioid epidemic. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, more than 47,000 people have died from an overdose in the last year. As a result, 3 Americans die every day from an opioid overdose. To ensure that podiatric medical students are prepared with the skills and knowledge to address the judicious use of opioids, and strategies to avoid delopig dependence, #PME has included the following elements in the newly revised accreditation standards:

Formulate strategies of pain management that minimize the occurrence of substance use, including but not limited to the use of opioids.

Additionally, the following standard has been proposed for inclusion in the revised standards and elements for approval of podiatric medicine and surgery residency programs:

The resident must be afforded instruction in the following:

- Resident will be instructed in substance use, fatigue mitigation, suicide prevention, and resident support.
- Pain management and opioid addiction.

#PME joins more than 55 other organizations to form the Association of Colleges of Podiatric Medical Education (#ACPE) to fight the U.S. Opioid Epidemic. This collaboration aligns with #PME's mission to promote the quality of doctoral education, postdoctoral education, certification, and continuing education. "By affirming that these programs meet established standards and elements, #PME sees to protect the public, podiatric medical students, and doctors of podiatric medicine.

#PME is committed to collaborating with the other partners to address this critical issue.
